POCKET PARK DEDICATED

The Village of Spring Hill's first pocket park was proudly dedicated to the people of Spring Hill on the evening of May 16, 2011. The rousing sounds of the Excelsior Band greeted residents and guests as they gathered near the park. Linda St. John, President of The Village of Spring Hill, Inc., welcomed all to the milestone event. Mayor Sam Jones, Council Member Gina Gregory, and Regions Bank South Alabama President Joel Daves all praised the community effort that made the park possible and the commitment of the people of Spring Hill to improving their community. Other elected officials present were Council Member Reggie Copeland and County Commissioners Connie Hudson and Merceria Ludgood.

Following the dedication, the crowd was led by the Excelsior Band up Old Shell Road to a delightful reception in the garden of Shamrock Rose & Thistle Tea Room and Gastro Pub in Holiday Place. The Village of Spring Hill is grateful to Tea Room owners Rhonda and Bill McGinnis for their warm hospitality. TVSH Board Member Bradley Sanders chaired the dedication and reception, ably assisted by Day Peake and Sherry Pierce.

This little jewel of a park in the heart of the Village was made possible through the generosity of the community. It was totally private funded. No government funds were used. was in Spring Hill where he grew up. Just as his parents before him, he was dedicated to his community and to his church, and when called

upon, he broadened his reach of service to the State of Alabama as a Senator in the state legislature from 1994 to 2006. Harry E. Myers, Jr., known affectionately as Happy (later shortened to Hap when he ran for Senate), wore many hats as a community leader and earned great respect and admiration among those with whom he served. He and his lovely wife, Toni, had the successful business Antoinette's Antiques for a number of years in the heart of Spring Hill.

With a warm smile and a positive attitude, Hap Myers was always ready to step forward to help his community or to advocate a cause. Such was the case when the newly formed non-profit organization The Village of Spring Hill, Inc. sought his counsel in 2006. He immediately embraced the organization's vision and secured a \$300,000 state grant to hire a city planner who could help the residents, businesses and city representatives come together for a plan to preserve the future of the Spring Hill community. Thus was born The Blueprint for Spring Hill. The grant also funded initial improvements to our neighborhood center, in particular the purchase of 10 old Mobile benches which grace the streets of the Village. Our community will forever be grateful for the key role Hap Myers played during those early, important beginnings of The Village of Spring Hill.

The Board of Directors mourns the loss of one of Spring Hill's finest. Let us all look around at the improvements in our Village and salute this man who had an important part in making it happen.

The Seen & Behind the Scene

The scene in the Village of Spring Hill has undoubtedly changed for the better over the past five years. Great strides have been made in creating a more attractive, safer and walkable community, thanks to the wonderful response of residents and businesses who have continued to support TVSH's efforts and those property owners who have made the necessary improvements to meet the streetscape codes set forth in the master plan.

Both the **seen** and the **unseen** aspects of our improvements rely heavily on the support of membership dues and contributions. Readily visible are the **flowers** in the plaza planter in front of CVS and in the recently completed **pocket park** next to Regions Bank. These beds are replaced seasonally. Our Village clock which was purchased with dues and donations by residents and community businesses requires yearly maintenance. In the early years of our organization, TVSH board members worked diligently with city and state officials to obtain funding for **sidewalks**, **benches** and the improved Old Shell/McGregor **intersection**, all of which greatly enhance the aesthetics and enjoyment of our Village scene.

Many improvements, projects and expenditures, however, are less visible or unseen. Much planning goes on behind the scene as Board members actively give of their time and talent to make things continue to happen in the Village.

- Whenever given the opportunity, Board members **meet** with individuals who may be interested in developing property in the designated areas of *The Blueprint for Spring Hill*. It is important to inform developers of the benefits of using the new optional coding found in the *Blueprint* and facilitate their understanding of its use.
- The Board continues to encourage property owners to build out the **streetscapes** in the Village. A built-out streetscape includes trees, grates, sidewalks and street lights. The Board has worked with Holiday Place, CVS, Regions Bank, and AT&T to implement their streetscapes in keeping with the master plan. The Village of Spring Hill is happy to work with any property owner or group within the designated areas of the *Blueprint* who wishes to im-

prove their streetscape. Further, the Board can act as an advocate to help them with city of Mobile department contacts and to facilitate the completion of their project.

- The VSH has funded **electrical boxes** which had to be installed to furnish power to the decorative street lights now in place. Two boxes have now been installed to date and additional ones will be added as the streetscapes are built out in the future.
- ed so that several projects can be "shovel-ready" when it is time to apply for a city, state or county grant. A "shovel-ready" project has a better chance of being funded over those that are in the initial planning stage. Engineering has been done for sidewalks down the north side of Old Shell Road to connect Lavretta Park with the already existing sidewalks to Langan Park. A feasibility study has been done for the proposed roundabout project at McGregor and Museum Drive. The Board is continuing to work with City Council Members Gina Gregory and Reggie Copeland, County Commissioner Connie Hudson and State Representative Jamie Ison to complete construction drawings so that the project will be "shovel-ready" once funding is secured.
- ▶ **Communication** is vital to the success of TVSH. Board members donate their expertise to maintain the organization's website, produce a yearly newsletter which is generously sponsored by community businesses, and distribute updates through its extensive emailing capability.
- ▶ The Board continues to **write grants** for funding to improve our community and to make it a safer and more attractive place to live.

Your continued membership and support is appreciated and is vital if we are to see additional improvements to our community. Building on our spirit as a close knit community is not only good for the health and wellbeing of our neighborhood, but it opens many doors as we work together to make our community the best that it can be. The Board thanks you for your contributions, your ideas and your volunteer services!! As our motto says, *Together we are Improving our Community*.

Sidewalks have been at the top of the Spring Hill wish list from the beginning of our organization. They are a key component of the Village Master Plan, supporting the connectivity of neighborhoods to schools, churches and parks and to our commercial areas within the Village.

The Village of Spring Hill, with the help of Representative **Jamie Ison**, was successful in securing a Transportation Enhancement Grant for \$379,000 to construct sidewalks down the south side of Old Shell Road. The popularity of these sidewalks has led us to pursue the necessary engineering for sidewalks on the north side as well. **TVSH continues to seek funding for this project through every source possible.**
